the Capitol Hill Arts Center. Part theater, part cabaret, part country show, *100 Heartbreaks* combines quick-witted storytelling with live country music inspired by the likes of Loretta Lynn, Hank Williams and Johnny Cash.

When it comes to pickups, hookups, and hangovers, Charlane Tucker is a pro. The aspiring country singer has been hitting dive bars across the country trying to polish her act and find 100 men who will love and leave her — all with the sole purpose of accumulating enough “country cred” to be taken seriously in Nashville. But when the leaving doesn’t come so easily one night, Charlane has to decide: Can you be too heartbroken even for country?

Joanna Horowitz is a Seattle-based writer, actor and alt-country singer. Though she’s nowhere near 100 heartbreaks, Joanna did manage to go on 30 first dates in her year writing this show, and she accumulated her own country “cred” growing up in Eastern Washington, where she performed at some suitably down-home venues. In Seattle, she’s acted and directed for Suzan-Lori Parks’ 365 Days/365 Plays project, directed for ArtsWest and Youth Theatre Northwest, and is the communications associate at Seattle Repertory Theatre.

Jennifer Zeyl is a Seattle-based designer and director. Her set and costume designs have been seen at Washington Ensemble Theatre, Seattle Repertory Theatre, ACT Theatre, INTIMAN Theatre, Seattle Children’s Theatre, Two River Theatre, The Empty Space Theatre, Benaroya Hall, The Village Theatre and Book-it Repertory Theatre, among others.
